

## Sir Frederick Banting makes history again, almost 100 years later

- Heffel, art market frontrunner offered 135 masterpieces at a live auction in Toronto on November 21 which surpassed \$22.7 million
- **Historic painting** depicting **Frederick Banting**'s insulin laboratory sold for \$313,250, ten times its presale estimate
- E.J. Hughes and Jean Paul Riopelle led the auction, with largescale canvases surpassing \$2 million each

TORONTO, November 21, 2018—<u>Heffel Fine Art Auction House</u>, Canada's leader in the international art market, is thrilled to share the results of its fall live auction today in Toronto, featuring 135 outstanding examples by artists from around the world. Masterpieces by Jean Paul Riopelle, Frederick Banting, Lawren Harris and E.J. Hughes stood out in the sale, and propelled the auction total to \$22.7 million. (All prices are in Canadian dollars and include a buyer's premium.)

History was made in tonight's sale with Frederick Banting's <u>The Lab</u>. Small, but undoubtedly monumental, the painting depicts the very laboratory where Banting and Charles Best made their lifesaving and Nobel Prize-winning discovery of insulin. The work saw major interest from across the world, and strongly resonated with many institutions and individuals. More than 20 competing bidders on the phones and in the auction room, a record for Heffel, drove the selling price to \$313,250, ten times its presale estimate and a new record for the artist.

Works by <u>E.J. Hughes</u> and <u>Jean Paul Riopelle</u> returned to the auction block after they were previously sold by Heffel more than a decade ago. Both outperformed their expected values and previous selling prices, surpassing \$2 million each. Hughes's masterpiece canvas *Fishboats, Rivers Inlet* broke the artist record and was particularly poignant as the auction room reflected on Hughes's previous joyous response at the 2004 sale of the same canvas.

"There was something truly special about the works in this auction. The relationships we have built with collectors near and far enabled us to thoughtfully curate this sale with so many treasured masterpieces," said David Heffel, President of Heffel Fine Art Auction House. "At the end of the day, we feel proud that as one collection sells, it contributes to the growth of another."

## Notable results from the Fall 2018 Live Auction

- Fishboats, Rivers Inlet, a masterpiece canvas by E.J. Hughes shattered the artist record and sold for \$2,041,250 (est. \$900,000 1,200,000). The canvas was first sold by Heffel in 2004 for \$920,000 and the artist himself joined the sale room to share in the moment.
- One of the most historically significant works Heffel has had the pleasure to offer sold for ten times its presale estimate. Frederick Banting's *The Lab*, depicting the laboratory where he and Best made their discovery of insulin, sold for \$313,250 (est. \$20,000 – 30,000). The Buyer's Premium for this work will be donated by Heffel to the Banting & Best Diabetes Centre at the University of Toronto.
- Four outstanding works by Jean Paul Riopelle led the *Post-War & Contemporary Art* sale and totalled \$4,138,750. The 1953 drip canvas, *Jouet* achieved a remarkable \$2,881,250 (est. \$1,200,000 1,600,000), followed by *Lances* for \$871,250 (est. \$200,000 250,000) and *Mi-chemin* for \$361,250 (est. \$250,000 350,000).



- Mountain Sketch XC, a glowing work by Lawren Harris broke the million dollar mark and sold for \$1,381,250 (est. \$700,000 900,000). A second Rocky Mountain oil on board, Mount Unwin and Charlton Maligne Lake, Jasper, sold for an noteworthy \$421,250 (est. \$200,000 300,000).
- Three highly collectible canvases by Colombian artist Fernando Botero sold for a total of \$2,163,750. Femme debout and Toro each brought in \$811,250 (est. \$500,000 700,000 and \$450,000 650,000, respectively) and Seated Man went for \$541,250 (est. \$400,000 600,000).
- Two exceptional examples by Quebec-born Jean Paul Lemieux fetched notable results. Les citadens sold for \$1,081,250 (est. \$900,000 – 1,200,000) and Jeune fille en uniforme, consigned from the Alma Mater Society of the University of British Columbia, sold for \$361,250 (est. \$300,000 – 500,000).
- Significant interest in two canvases by Emily Carr drove their prices beyond presale estimates. *Spring Wave* went for a final price of \$511,250 (est. \$300,000 500,000) and *By the Canal, Crécy-en-Brie* went for \$181,250 (est. \$80,000 120,000).
- Paintings by the internationally renowned Alex Colville are rare to the market and highly sought-after. Two Boys Playing, a work depicting the artist's sons, sold for \$721,250 (est. \$600,000 800,000) and Chaplain, another fantastic example, achieved \$541,250 (est. \$500,000 700,000).
- Important works by all original members of the Group of Seven were offered in the fall auction, highlighted by Arthur Lismer's extraordinary *Tugs and Troop Carrier, Halifax Harbour, Nova Scotia* which sold for \$781,250 (est. \$700,000 900,000) and A.Y. Jackson's stunning *November, Georgian Bay,* which sold for \$631,250 (est. \$400,000 600,000).
- Sybil Andrews's *Boats at Dock* was picked up at a British Columbia thrift store for quite a bargain. It was purchased for \$69.95, less a 30% seniors' discount and sold tonight for \$52,250 (est. \$20,000 50,000).
- Four artist records were broken in the fall auction including the sale of *Preserving Summer Black Currant Jam* by Mary Pratt for \$133,250 (est. \$30,000 \$40,000) and *House in August* by Christopher Pratt for \$253,250 (est. \$80,000 \$120,000).

Heffel is currently accepting consignments for the spring 2019 auction season, inclusive of international works of art. The deadline for spring consignments is February 2019.
